Windows 10 Upgrade

We have started installing Windows 10 on new University-owned computers and older machines that need updating.

This change only applies to computers provided to employees in Glassboro. Faculty and staff in Glassboro who bring a University-owned computer in for repair may be told the machine will be returned to them with the Windows 10 operating system and Office 2016.

Please let a technician know if this change may interfere with software you need to fulfill your job responsibilities.

Tip of the Month

How to Create a Strong Password



Developing a strong and secure password is one of the best ways to safeguard your personal information from cybercriminals, but remembering complicated passwords for multiple accounts can be a challenge. Overcome that obstacle by trying this technique:

First, make up a sentence you can easily remember, such as:

- I have two kids: Jack and Jill.
- I like to eat Ben & Jerry's ice cream.

Now, take the first letter of every word in the sentence and include the punctuation. Use numerals for more variety. The above sentences would become:

- Ih2k:JaJ.
- IlteB&J'ic.

Students Targeted by Scams

Recent Phishing Attacks Include Bogus Job Offers

Several recent phishing attacks have targeted Rowan University students. These scams included emails claiming to offer students jobs with Bertram Books and Bizfilings. The emails asked for personal information, including students' addresses and dates of birth. Some victims of these scams were sent a check and instructions that, if followed, resulted in the loss of funds from their checking accounts.

Please remember, if you receive an email asking for any personal information, make sure you are confident of its legitimacy before following links contained in it or responding in any way.

Another recent scam that targeted Gmail users, including Rowan student Gmail accounts, posed as a Google Docs request from a trusted contact. If clicked, recipients were asked to give this bogus Google Docs app permission to manage their real Google account, giving scammers access to their email and more.

If you receive a suspicious message, don't reply, don't click any links, don't open any attachments and don't respond. But please forward suspicious messages to support@rowan.edu so we can investigate.

IRT Policy Spotlight

Acceptable Use Policy

Students, staff and faculty are expected to access and use the University's electronic information and information systems in a manner that does not compromise the confidentiality, integrity or availability of those assets, reflects the University's standards and in accordance with all applicable federal, state and local laws.

As established in the University's Acceptable Use Policy, the following actions are among those that are prohibited:

- Attempting to uninstall, bypass or disable security settings or software protecting the University's electronic information, information systems or computer hardware.
- Distributing information classified as confidential or private without authorization.
- Sharing passwords with other individuals or institutions (regardless if they are affiliated with Rowan or not) or otherwise leaving passwords unprotected.

For the month of April, we detected and blocked 168 virus attacks and 24,000 emails with malicious URLs sent to our network.
